

Mandate

The *Concordia Undergraduate Journal of Art History* (CUJAH) is a student-run annual publication that aims to showcase the talents of Concordia University's undergraduate Art History and Fine Arts students. The CUJAH is composed of an executive committee of editors, copy editors, feature writers, designers, a webmaster, and is assisted by staff and faculty members in the Department of Art History.

As a journal, we strive for academic excellence. Through a blind-review process, CUJAH selects essays for our published volumes which best exemplify the diversity of talents within the Faculty of Fine Arts and the Concordia community at large. We have been publishing since 2004-2005, and have just released our twelfth volume. Over the past years CUJAH has also expanded into the realm of feature writing, promoting artists and events within the Concordia Fine Arts community and in Montreal at large.

In addition to the publication of our annual journal and web publication of features, CUJAH hosted its 5th Annual Undergraduate Art History Conference, which had as its theme **Art, the Sacred, and the Profane**. This year, in collaboration with Art Matters Festival, we invited four student artists whose practices overlapped with the theme of the conference. The keynote speaker for this conference was Dr. Alena Robin from The University of Western Ontario whose talk, "Mexico City's Way of the Cross: Art, the Sacred, and the Profane," was related to the content of her recently published book, *Las capillas del Vía Crucis de la ciudad de México: arte, patrocinio y sacralización del espacio*, by the Instituto de Investigaciones Estéticas/UNAM (2014).

In 2014-2015, CUJAH & FASA launched their first joint publication, titled *The Voice Of...*, a publication aimed at showcasing the talent and work of student-artists and art historians at Concordia. This year, CUJAH and the VAV Gallery built upon this collaboration to create EXPAND, an exhibition and accompanying catalogue featuring student artists and aspiring art historians.

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Executive Committee

Daniel S. Sáenz is a student of Religion and Art History at Concordia University. 
